Cancer (malignant neoplasm) is a class of diseases in which a group of cells display uncontrolled growth, invasion, and sometimes metastasis to other locations in the body via lymph or blood.

I got that definition from the online dictionary/encyclopedia, *Wikipedia*. Such a simple, straightforward definition for such a potentially devastating event in a person's life, the unalarming words represent an alarming reality for many people. Cancer can affect any person, even life still in the womb. Cancer can affect animals as well. Although many cures have come to the fore (thank you to the scientific researchers!) cancer is still a chronic or acute disease that touches many lives. It honors no boundaries and recognizes no exceptions. Cancer has probably affected most of the lives of the people who are reading this newsletter.

The Bar Harbor Congregational Church, United Church of Christ has most certainly not received a pass on cancer. Right now we have several members and friends who are fighting their own battles and many others have family members who have been afflicted by cancer. We are all too familiar with prayer concerns for those who have been diagnosed with cancer and are receiving treatment. We have had our share of survivors and we have lost some very dear friends to this formidable enemy. I have watched and waited with many of our church family who have courageously faced this unwanted intrusion into their lives. I have been moved by the grace and faith in which our friends have moved through difficult days, sleepless nights and debilitating treatments. I have grieved with you when you were diagnosed, watched with you as your hair fell out, and prayed with you as your strength ebbed and flowed. You have been an inspiration to me and a testimony to the power of God at work in our lives.

Being a cancer survivor myself, I know the toll cancer

can take on a person. Loving someone who has been dealing with cancer for a long time, I know the pain of the one who watches and waits. I know that when one of us in our congregation suffers we all suffer and, together, we celebrate each triumph. We are journeying together and sometimes cancer walks with us.

Right now, several of our members and friends are dealing with various kinds of cancers. As I write, many of our dear ones are affected by cancer and, in turn, so are we. I invite all of us to be in prayer for those among us who are dealing with the reality of cancer and commend them to God's strength, healing, and always, always, His love. If cancer is a part of your life, please know that you are not alone, but held in prayer and concern.

Let me leave you with these words, written by an unknown author:

What Cancer Cannot Do

Cancer is so limited . . .

It cannot cripple love

It cannot shatter hope

It cannot corrode faith

It cannot destroy peace

It cannot kill friendship

It cannot suppress memories

It cannot silence our courage

It cannot invade the soul

It cannot steal eternal life

It cannot conquer the spirit.

The Minister's Discretionary Account

The Minister's Discretionary Account is used to meet the needs of the people of our church as well as those in the area. The money is often used for food, gasoline, home heating oil, medical bills, or rent for a person in need who comes to the church for help. From the Discretionary Account, Sandra sends about \$1,000 per year to the Maine Seacoast Mission and that money is used for needs of people in Bar Harbor and around MDI. We are fortunate that the Maine Seacoast Mission is willing to do this distribution for us. Sandra also sends money from the Discretionary Account to the Maine Seacoast Mission's fund for home heating oil.

Several organizations within the church, primarily the Women's Auxiliary and the Outreach Board, have contributed funds to the Minister's Discretionary Account. Some individuals have also contributed to the account. The church also has a line item in the annual budget for a donation. This is wonderful and helps our church to do some outreach that we would otherwise be unable to do.

If you would like to contribute to the Minister's Discretionary Account, please make your check out to the Bar Harbor Congregational Church, UCC and note in the memo line that it is for the Minister's Discretionary Account. Then, please give the check to Sandra (or mail it to her attention) so it doesn't get mixed in with the checks made out to our general budget needs. When Sandra receives a check for the Minister's Discretionary Account, she notifies Paul to give the donor credit on their church donations for the year. Donations to the Minister's Discretionary Account are tax deductible under the law.

THE BAR HARBOR CONGREGATION YOUTH TO CARE FOR THOSE IN NEED ON SUPER BOWL SUNDAY

While America turns their attention to football for Super Bowl XLIII, local teens are working to transform Super Bowl weekend into the nation's largest youth-led weekend of giving and serving -- ***The Souper Bowl of Caring***.

The Sunday of the big game, Souper Bowl of Caring youth will collect donations through congregations and schools and donate 100% of their collection to a local charity of their choice. Souper Bowl of Caring started with one church youth group in South Carolina in 1990 when a young minister prayed, "Lord, even as we enjoy the Super Bowl football game, help us be mindful of those without even a bowl of soup to eat." From that prayer, the Souper Bowl of Caring was born and more than \$50 million has been raised nationwide.

"For two decades, young people have been setting the standard for compassion and service through the Souper Bowl of Caring," said Rev. Brad Smith, Founder and Executive Director. "Now, more and more people across the country are catching on and joining this amazing effort."

On Super Bowl Sunday, February 1st, our youth will be collecting \$1.00 and/or non-perishables after church.

Our youth will join more than 17,000 congregations, schools, civic clubs and businesses signed up to participate as part of the nationwide Souper Bowl of Caring effort to transform Super Bowl weekend into the nation's largest youth-led weekend of giving and serving now in its 20th year.

"Imagine the impact we could make if the 100 million Americans who tune in to the big game gave just \$1 each to help someone in need," said Smith. "I hope everyone will follow the lead of these young people and get involved this year."

A Day for Ashes

Since the Middle Ages, Christians in the so-called Western Church have observed Ash Wednesday (the seventh Wednesday before Easter) as the first day of Lent. On this day, in many churches, worshipers receive ashes on the forehead as a reminder of their sorrow for their sins. The ashes are often made by burning palm branches left over from the previous year's Palm Sunday. Ash Wednesday is February 25 this year.

Lent commemorates Jesus' fast and temptation in the wilderness of Judea Province, which, according to the Gospel, lasted 40 days. Just as Jesus confronted his temptations during these 40 days, Lent helps Christians focus on our most basic need as sinners: forgiveness.

The only way our Lord's forgiving power can become effective in our lives is by our taking the initiative to confront our sins, confess them and repent of them. In short, Lent is a season of penitence.

Significance of Lent

Lent is the fourth season of the Christian year. Its length is the 40 days preceding Easter Day, not counting Sundays. This means Lent always begins on a Wednesday, known as Ash Wednesday.

Some Christians fast during Lent. This denial of bodily comforts can help encourage self-reflection about the need for Jesus' forgiveness.
