From the Pastor:

What a wonderful Easter we had! The highest holy day was celebrated with great joy at our church. I am so very grateful for the wonderful music, the excitement of the young people, and the beauty of the flowers gracing our chancel. All in all, a fitting offering to God in gratitude and praise for God's goodness. I hope you were there to enjoy the festivities. (By the way, thanks to the Deacons for providing both a scrumptious breakfast and a delectable coffee hour. You outdid yourselves!)

And so, where do we go from here? Throughout the season of Lent we engaged in an inward examination to see what we needed to do to ready ourselves to serve God more effectively and faithfully. We moved through Holy Week, reliving Jesus' passion, and emerged on Easter celebrating Christ's victory. Now what? Is there anything else we can do?

You already knew I was going to say yes, of course, there is much to be done! According to the liturgical calendar, we will remain in Easter for awhile, and fifty days after Easter, we will celebrate Pentecost, the coming of the Holy Spirit into Christ's Church on earth. Pentecost will be celebrated on June 12 during our worship service. Then we move into a time that is referred to as

"Ordinary Time." This liturgical season lasts for many weeks.

It has always bothered me that this is referred to as Ordinary Time. Actually, there are two periods of liturgical time called Ordinary Time: just after Epiphany and just after Pentecost. What could possibly be ordinary about the days following the birth of our Savior, His Resurrection, and the coming of the Holy Spirit to His Church? Well, nothing, as it turns out.

Ordinary Time is defined in this way:

...the season of the Christian liturgical calendar. The English name is intended to translate the Latin term, Tempus per annum (literally "time through the year"). The weeks in Ordinary Time are numbered, although several Sundays are named for the feast they commemorate, such as Trinity Sunday (first Sunday after Pentecost) and the Feast of Christ the King (last Sunday in Ordinary Time). The liturgical color normally assigned to Ordinary Time is green.

The actual number of weeks of Ordinary Time in any given year can total 33 or 34.

So, I say to myself, if Ordinary Time takes up so much of the calendar year, the term “Ordinary” must have some meaning that is not our normal interpretation of the word. Now, what could that be?

As I have contemplated this, I have come to believe that we call this Ordinary Time because during this time we are living under the conditions which God intended for us, conditions given to us by God. We are living in the grace of God becoming flesh in the form of a baby in a manger and we are living in the deep and abiding joyful salvation found in an empty tomb. Ordinary? Hardly. However, it is life as God intended. Therefore, in a sense, the time is ordinary, what we can trust and have come to expect from the love of God in our everyday lives.

At our Easter service this year, our Scripture told us the account of Jesus having gone ahead of his followers, after the Resurrection, to Galilee and He invites them and us to meet him there. This powerful message reminds us that Easter is not the end of anything, but the beginning, the beginning of our living out of what it means to follow a crucified and risen Lord. As I read the Scriptures, I am more and more convinced that Jesus was teaching us an important lesson when he said we should first love God and then love our neighbors as ourselves. This was no idle remark, but rather an invitation to grow in faith and grow closer in relationship to God by serving others. For me, the picture of our risen Lord going on to Galilee is an apt description of what is expected of us: look for Him and where you find Him you will find ways in which to serve Him.

I hope your Easter was blessed with joy and hope. Please look to your church to find ways in which to live out your Easter faith. As followers of Christ it is our vocation to see where He is at work and to join Him.

Happy Birthday, Barbara Adler!

It was a joyful celebration attended by several members of our church, as Sonogee Rehabilitation and Living Center observed Barbara Adler’s 100th birthday and welcomed her into that special club only for centagenarians. There was music by Jack Drake and cake and ice cream galore. A good time was had by all.

In observance of Barbara’s hitting the 100 mark, here is an article reprinted from the *Sonogee Grapevine*, June, 2008. Thanks to author, Anne Molavi.

It’s been interesting to hear parts of Barbara Adler’s life story as she has related her memories to the Newsletter group from time to time. So it was no surprise that she started off our interview together by telling me, with a good deal of pride, that her father had a hand in building the last three-masted schooner, the “JK Morgan,” out of Milbridge, ME in the early twentieth century. Barbara recalled that she was about nine years old then and had just received her new blue hat for Easter. She persuaded her mother to let her wear it – whereupon Barbara promptly used it to catch junk her brother tossed into it from the schooner under construction, and the brand new hat fell into the sea! At the sound of her screams, work had to stop to try to retrieve the hat. Her father was none too pleased, she remembered.

Father was James Strout, a house and ship builder. Nellie, her mother, was a homemaker who raised their two children, Barbara, born in April, 1911, and her brother, Kenneth, who was four years her

senior. Barbara graduated from Milbridge High School, and then went to Gorham (now University of Southern Maine), where she studied French and English. Afterwards she taught third, fourth, and fifth grades in Milbridge for five years. To help pay for her studies, Barbara waitressed in Bar Harbor at the DeGregoire and Belmont Hotels when she was about nineteen or twenty years old.

One day she needed to buy a dress, and chose one at Adler's Shop on Cottage Street in Bar Harbor; she paid for it over time. That, Barbara says, is how she met her husband, Harry Adler, who owned the shop, and later, the Town and Country Store on Main Street too. After courtship and an October wedding, the couple lived above Adler's Shop, where they eventually raised their three sons. They were married fifty years.

Barbara began working in her husband's shops when he was feeling under the weather – and she liked it so much that she continued working, even while raising the family. When time permitted she knit, crocheted, and embroidered. Reading has also been a lifelong favorite pastime, as the stacks of books in her room attest; there is no television.

Barbara came to Sonogee a couple of years ago from her place at Birch Bay Village in Hulls Cove; her left leg was giving her trouble, and she needed rehab. The leg is still a problem, she says, so she uses a wheelchair to get around. Barbara says everyone at Sonogee is very nice, and she enjoys the lovely views of the sea.

Happy, happy birthday, Barbara! May God bless and keep you.

Exciting News from the Music Committee

For the past many years, our worship services have been graced by the wonderful music emanating from our chancel organ. Each of our organists has used this powerful instrument to its maximum capacity and we, as worshipers, have been blessed by their work.

This organ, which has served us faithfully for so many years, was dedicated to the memory of Margaret Harriman Dyer, who served as our organist for nearly thirty years. Margaret was a true gift to our church and to our community and we are grateful for her inestimable contribution to our church. We are grateful that her descendants are still members of our church, for they inherited Margaret's love of music, love of church, and insistence on doing a job well.

This wonderful organ has served us well, but after many years, like any musical instrument, problems have developed. We have had a wonderful technician working on the organ for the past several years, but not everything has been able to be corrected. There were no plans to replace the organ, but we were clear that repairs and upkeep would begin to happen more and more frequently as time passed.

Several months ago, we were told of a parishioner who wanted to make a lasting contribution to the church in loving memory of her husband. After much thinking and soul-searching, she suggested that a new organ might be a fitting memorial. We were approached with the idea, along with the Trustees and our pastor, and all of us agreed that we would be honored to accept her gift. With Kimberly Haller's help we engaged in a period of investigation of just what organs were available and what their capabilities were. After deliberation, we all agreed on a digital organ that will more than meet the needs and expectations of our church.

We did a great deal of research and finally went to hear an organ that was similar to the particular one we were considering. We were very impressed with the instrument. Therefore, we are pleased to announce that sometime this late spring/early summer a new organ will be delivered to our church and installed by Allen Organ of Maine.

We are grateful to Binky MacQuinn for this wonderful gift to our church which is being given in loving memory of her husband, and our friend, Ronnie MacQuinn. Ronnie was such a faithful member of our church and a lover of music, which makes this gift even more appropriate.

With gratitude for the past and hope for the future, we will soon be enjoying this new addition to our church. There will be more details in next month's *Chimes*, so be sure to keep watching.

Puzzle BROOCH

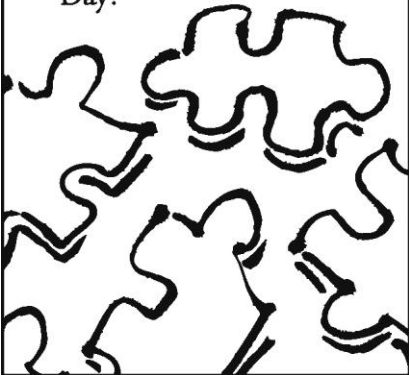
Make this keepsake to let your mom, grandma or aunt know that you wouldn't be complete without her!

What you need:

- Several old puzzle pieces
- Acrylic paints
- Paintbrush
- Craft glue
- Sequins or small buttons
- Metal jewelry safety pin (flat on the bottom)

What you do:

1. Paint the puzzle pieces and let them dry.
2. Come up with a design; for example, place two pieces on the bottom and one on top.
3. Glue the pieces in place so they form one brooch. Decorate by gluing on sequins or buttons.
4. When the brooch is completely dry, glue a jewelry safety pin on the bottom.
5. Give the gift on Mother's Day!
